


Baseball Chart – PF023

<p>Description</p>	<p>◆ This colorful 24" x 36" laminated chart depicts the baseball field, player positions, along with a brief description on the duties of each position, a game overview, scoring, and other key components and facts about the game. Designed as an educational tool, this poster will foster a better understanding of baseball and it's rules. Perfect for enthusiasts, educational institutions, sports teams, etc.</p>

The chart also shows the "Home Plate", "Catcher's Box", "Foul Lines", "Foul Line", "Infield", "Outfield", and "Go-Back Circle".</p> <p>Field Positions The first objective of all players is to catch any ball that has been hit in the air before it touches the ground so this is an increasingly "hot" for the batter.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1 Pitcher Throws the ball to the Catcher, trying to get it through the batter's glove without the batter hitting it. They use a variety of different pitches to get the ball past the batter. The Pitcher must wait for a "strike" to count "1st strike", if the batterman strikes to get a ground ball. 2 Catcher The Catcher signals to the Pitcher what type of pitch to use. They also hold the area around home plate. 3 First Base The main responsibility of the person on First Base is to catch the ball. They must remain close to First Base to tag someone out, by either touching the base with their foot or by touching the runner with the ball or glove with ball in it. 4 Second Base Second Base fields the area between First and Second Base. This position is not on Second Base, but rather in the upper corner between First and Second base. 5 Third Base The person on Third Base fields the area near Third Base trying to get ground balls and throw them to First Base. They also cover First Base by catching balls and tagging someone out. 6 Shortstop The Shortstop is responsible for the area from First Base and up the middle between Second Base. Other than someone playing on the team, they try to keep the ball in the infield. 7 Left Field The Left Fielder covers the area in the left outfield by trying to prevent the ball from going in and over the back fence. They try to get the ball back to the infield as quickly as possible. 8 Center Field Covers the area in the center outfield by trying to prevent the ball from going to the back fence. They try to get the ball back to the infield as quickly as possible. 9 Right Field Covers the area in the right outfield by trying to prevent the ball from going to the back fence. They try to get the ball back to the infield as quickly as possible. <p>Game Overview OFFENSE (Batting): Each batter has three chances ("strikes") to hit the ball, which must be thrown by the Pitcher through the batter's zone. If the batter hits, they run to First Base, unless the ball goes outside the Foul Line or is hit into the air (a "fly ball"). If they make it to first base, it's a "hit". Before the defense throws the ball back, they are "safe". Batters are entitled to proceed directly to first base (known as a "walk") if the Pitcher throws four bad pitches ("balls"), which they do not swing at, or if a pitch hits the batter. OFFENSE (Pitching): The pitcher can be left-handed or right-handed. They can throw the ball in either hand, so they must alternate F-Throws and R-Throws alternating between them. A pitcher who comes up to bat can advance the count by hitting the ball or being a "walk". If the count is "full" ("balls") with the ball between the bases, then the runner is "tagged" with the ball between the bases, then the runner is "out" when they reach Home Plate safely, if the ball is hit over the fence. DEFENSE: The defense uses a variety of techniques to try and prevent the offense from scoring. The Pitcher tries to get batters out by throwing their "glove" (unless the batter is unable to hit it) or to make the batterman try to prevent the batter from scoring it in their hands, either by catching the ball in the air or throwing the ball to First Base before the batter reaches it. If the batter reaches it to First Base or beyond, they try to tag them with the ball between bases. Alternatively, they may throw the ball to a base that a runner has been tagged to advance toward by another runner having been getting them out. Once the defense makes these outs, they become the offense.</p> <p>QUICK FACT BOX OBJECT OF THE GAME: Score more runs than the opposition. DEFENSE: Prevent the offense from scoring. OFFENSE: Score runs by hitting the ball into the field of play, or by being a "walk". PLAYING: The game is played on a field with a pitcher's mound, bases, and home plate.
